## General marking principles for Higher French Reading

*Always apply these general principles. Use them in conjunction with the detailed marking instructions, which identify the key features required in candidates' responses.*

- (a) Always use positive marking. This means candidates accumulate marks for the demonstration of relevant skills, knowledge and understanding; marks are not deducted for errors or omissions.
- (b) If a candidate response does not seem to be covered by either the principles or detailed marking instructions, and you are uncertain how to assess it, you must seek guidance from your team leader.
- (c) Award a mark for each answer. Marks are not transferable between questions and the answers for each question must come from the item.
- (d) Marks are available as follows:
  - (i) The first set of questions (worth 18 marks in total) asks candidates to provide answers based on comprehension of information from the text. There are generally 1-3 marks available for each question.
  - (ii) The penultimate question is the overall purpose question, and candidates must identify the overall purpose of the text and draw meaning from their overall understanding of the text. There is a maximum of 2 marks available for reference to the text and detailed comment. Pegged mark descriptors (2/1/0) and associated commentary are available, along with further guidance, in the detailed marking instructions.
  - (iii) The last question is the translation. For this question, candidates must translate the underlined section of the text. The section for translation is divided into five sense units. For each sense unit, award 2, 1 or 0 marks: 2 marks for a full translation, 1 for partial translation, and 0 for an unsuccessful attempt.
- (e) Award marks according to the accuracy and relevance of the candidate's answers. Award marks where the answer is accurate but expressed in their own words.

6.	<p><i>Assertion (1 mark):</i></p> <p>Yes, because the text is (mainly/mostly) positive and points out the many advantages/has more positive than negative points.</p> <p><b>OR</b></p> <p>The text has a balanced view by highlighting some of the advantages and disadvantages.</p> <p>When candidates indicate a <b>balanced</b> view, they should include a positive <b>and</b> negative justification.</p> <p>Award <b>0 marks</b> for assertion where:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• the candidate states that the experience is <b>entirely</b> positive/negative</li> <li>• the candidate states “Yes, it is a valuable experience” without expanding.</li> </ul> <p><i>Justification (1 mark):</i></p> <p>The writer refers to advantages and personal benefits, such as:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• it enables students to have a bigger flat</li> <li>• you feel much less isolated as there are other flatmates</li> <li>• there is always someone to cheer you up</li> <li>• you can learn about a different culture, new dishes, new lifestyles</li> <li>• you can make new/long-term friends</li> <li>• friendships might end up in a couple/relationship</li> </ul>	2	<p>Award <b>2 marks</b> where the candidate provides a clear answer, with justification that shows an accurate reading of the text.</p> <p>Award <b>1 mark</b> where the candidate provides an answer which may contain some degree of misreading, but which offers evidence of some justification.</p> <p>Award <b>0 marks</b> where the candidate simply provides information to be found in the text by simply re-stating answers to previous questions.</p>

Award marks according to the quality and accuracy of the translation into English.</p> <p>Award a mark for each sense unit, as follows:</p> <p><b>2 marks – good</b> The candidate understands and conveys essential information and relevant details, clearly and accurately, with appropriate use of English.</p> <p><b>1 mark – satisfactory</b> The candidate understands and conveys essential information clearly and comprehensibly, although some of the details may be translated in an imprecise or inaccurate manner. They convey the key message in spite of inaccuracies and weaknesses in the use of English.</p> <p><b>0 marks – unsatisfactory</b> The candidate fails to demonstrate sufficient understanding of the essential idea.</p>
